

## Meeting today's challenges for tomorrow's leaders

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When we launched the Vanguard Strong Start for Kids Program™ five years ago, our long-term investment vision was an important driver of our philanthropic strategy. We continue to believe that powerful choices made today can set up a lifetime of success. During the 2020–2021 program year, child care providers and the families they serve faced unprecedented challenges amid the COVID-19 pandemic, calls for social justice, and an often-contentious political climate.

The pandemic forced a new normal for all and compounded stressors for the most vulnerable people and systems, including young children, the adults who care for them, and the early care and learning sector at large. The Strong Start for Kids portfolio was intentionally designed to provide nimble, strategically responsive philanthropy. The incidents of the last year and a half required us to lean into this nimbleness, act urgently, and respond to evolving need.

Amid these challenges, we maintained our long-term focus because investing early helps give children the best chance for success in school and in life. Studies show that kids with access to high-quality early education are 25% more likely to graduate high school and four times more likely to have completed a bachelor's degree or higher, and earn up to 25% more in wages as an adult.

Since its inception, Strong Start has invested \$52 million (from crew and corporate donations) and partnered with 45 grantees on 117 projects to help build an ecosystem of supports for resilient families, effective programs, and connected communities. During this program year, evidence-based programs funded by Strong Start grants surpassed a half million children served since inception. The largest of those programs, Reach Out and Read, has distributed more than one million books, which reflects more than one million discussions between pediatricians and families about the importance of daily reading routines for healthy child development.

Looking ahead, the Strong Start portfolio plans to continue its focus on responding to the ongoing child care crisis and participating in the sector's rebuilding, meeting the evolving needs of children and families, and calibrating our equity work within the field. We have seen the early impacts of our efforts in each of these areas and will continue to build partnerships and strategies to help the early education sector thrive.

We thank you, our partners, and our colleagues for your continued support of this important work.



### Responding to a prolonged pandemic

#### Addressing the evolving needs of a disrupted sector

Many of the child care centers and child services programs we support have been hit particularly hard by the pandemic's financial and social impacts. Some parents are reluctant to allow their children to return to early childhood programs, while other families are keeping their children home because of financial stresses such as job loss, food insecurity, or homelessness. For the centers, incorporating new health and safety practices require money, time, and emotional stamina, which often took attention and resources away from immediate program needs and ongoing improvement efforts. Many centers have closed because of staffing issues, these new requirements, or lower and uncertain enrollment.

To help address the most pressing needs, the portfolio implemented rapid response funds that provided essential, immediate support to early childhood education providers until public dollars became available. This included supporting grantees as they reallocated funds within their projects to help meet the basic needs of their children, families, and staff in the disrupted environment. Many programs supported by Strong Start, such as ParentChild+, quickly pivoted to adapt their service models to offer virtual support; others addressed urgent needs by reallocating funding toward food, shelter, clothing, and more.



One program supported by Strong Start for Kids, Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports, was recognized this year for its work to adapt during this extraordinary time. The <u>article</u> in <u>ZERO TO THREE Journal</u> <sup>1</sup> also notes the importance of rapid response funds to early learning providers.

#### **About Strong Start for Kids**

#### Supporting child care businesses and children in crisis

The child care industry has long struggled to create a functional business model that offers the right balance of high-quality supply/access and resources to help recruit and retain experienced, trained, and certified teachers. Compound that with post-COVID issues—including parents' reticence to return to child care, a workforce recruitment crisis, and ongoing health concerns (particularly for children)—and rebuilding the sector becomes even more complicated.

Public and private capital have been critical for early learning providers over the last year. This includes a funder collaborative initiated by Strong Start, Philadelphia Emergency Fund for Stabilization of Early Education, which is supported by new funders in the form of cash infusions. The sector has also benefited from additional capital and technical assistance, such as that offered by Strong Start for Kids partner Public Health Management Corporation. But the sector, and the stakeholders who interact with it, remains very fragile.

Although COVID-19's impact on young children's overall physical health has been relatively small (but concerning given the emergence of new strains of the virus), its impact on many other developmental domains has been profound. According to the National Institutes of Health, COVID-19 "not only suspended normal childhood activities such as attending school, interacting with extended family and friends, playing outdoors, and exploring nature, but also disrupted the consequent socioemotional benefits that accrue from children's engagement in these experiences." This year, Strong Start intentionally supported projects that enabled young children, families, and providers to adapt mentally and emotionally, including a grant to long-time portfolio partner First Up to address trauma in and out of the classroom for children, teachers, and parents.



#### Pursuing quality in the midst of a pandemic

The Strong Start for Kids portfolio maintains a long-term, disciplined focus to drive meaningful and measurable social impact in the early childhood sector.

Many projects adapted their approaches in response to the pandemic while continuing to drive improvements that advance the goal of preparing more children from low-income communities to be ready for school. We'd like to highlight one such program, Slide Into Success. The program, started in 2019 by Smith Memorial Playground & Playhouse, Parent Infant Center, and First Up, provides training for early childhood teachers. Its goal is to improve the quality of early childhood education programs in North Philadelphia.

Slide Into Success provides opportunities for classroom coaching; peer observations; and play, nature, and project-based learning in the areas of literacy, math, and science. Despite the constraints of the pandemic, the program supported, provided resources for, and trained early learning providers to help raise their quality ratings.

#### Investing for impact

Across the world, more stakeholders are recognizing that investments in young children and the programs that serve them have the power to change a child's (and, ultimately, society's) long-term potential. Despite important public and philanthropic efforts, among others, the early care sector lacks the capacity and comprehensive reach to deliver high-quality services to all the children who

need them. We aim to do our part to change that.

The Vanguard Strong Start for Kids
Program is driven by decades of research
demonstrating that high-quality,
evidence-based investments made in
the first few years of a child's life lead
to lifelong cognitive, emotional, and
economic improvements.

Our philanthropic dollars strategically target three levers that have a proven track record for improving school readiness in communities:

- 1 Programs that cultivate the role of parents and caregivers through one-on-one individualized and/or group experiences. These evidence-based programs help improve parenting practices and networks. They also increase critical connections to social supports that promote child health and well-being.
- 2 Programs that support high-quality improvement, expansion, and sustainability efforts for early learning centers and foster teacher development through training, coaching, and apprenticeship programs.
- Projects that mobilize communities by coordinating early learning systems and stakeholders, and educating policymakers to advocate for more—and more equitable—public funding.

When children are supported in their early years, they are more prepared to succeed in school, lead healthier lives, and strengthen their communities. Supporting nurturing home environments for infants and toddlers, high-quality classrooms, and a strong early childhood sector in our communities has never been more vital.

#### Partnering for impact

Our work fosters partnerships to advance family support and early learning programming in the highest-need communities near Vanguard's largest corporate operations. We respect and build on local strengths to ensure that families, programs, and communities have the resources to help all children have the best possible start in life.

Strong Start's key opportunity for impact lies not just in grantmaking but in Vanguard's ability to leverage other philanthropic assets in support of early childhood education in underserved communities. In particular, we advocate for increased, sustainable public funding to address racial disparities in access to high-quality services and opportunities for children of color. We partner with leading philanthropic and private institutions that share our vision for young children. We also recognize the strengths of community-based organizations

and seek to elevate their leadership and reach. Strong Start considers race and inequity as a lens for understanding differentiated outcomes. Accordingly, we have made grants and sought leadership opportunities in an effort to create a more level playing field. Data show that nonprofits led by people of color receive less funding than nonprofits with white leadership teams. Strong Start implements best practices to engage with members of these underserved communities so that our grantmaking and decision-making are informed by direct feedback rather than by indirect needs assessments.

Listening to grantees, parents, and the provider community helps us gain perspective on where and how additional funding could have the most impact and will help shape our future investments.

#### Five years of making an impact

Strong Start for Kids is a balanced portfolio of investments focused on creating conditions in our target communities that allow all children, regardless of race or zip code, to have access to the types of affordable, high-quality child care and early learning experiences that prepare them for school. Our portfolio casts a broad net, working with the best partners that reach children and families where they are: at home, in pediatrician offices, in child care settings (both center-based and home-based), and in the community.

In some cases, projects provide direct services to children, families, and early childhood educators. In other cases, projects focus on building partnerships across the social services sector to strengthen and coordinate service delivery or expand access to services by increasing public investment in the early childhood sector.

School readiness is often viewed as a point-in-time, individual assessment of a child's ability as they enter kindergarten. Some school districts use formal kindergarten readiness assessments, though these assessments are inconsistent in design, purpose, and usage. Strong Start's focus on school readiness reflects a broader definition—the culmination of consistent exposure to nurturing environments and developmental learning experiences that lay the foundation for physical, cognitive,

and social-emotional development during a child's first five years.

Although most children who benefit from projects that Strong Start supports are not formally assessed, Strong Start relies on the wealth of research about quality childhood experiences that lead to school readiness. Strong Start delivers social impact by promoting those experiences among families, increasing access to those experiences, and strengthening the richness of those experiences in under-resourced settings.

This report marks the conclusion of five full years of early childhood investment since the inception of Strong Start for Kids. In that time, Strong Start has funded 117 projects totaling **\$52 million**; 94% of closed projects met primary objectives and delivered meaningful results to the community. To date, Strong Start's resources have helped **502,000** people, including **1,000** early childhood educators. Strong Start invested in the creation of nearly **2,200** new child care/pre-K seats, and our COVID-19 emergency funding helped retain more than **31,000** seats at centers that faced the prospect of permanent closure.


Advocacy organizations supported by Strong Start in Pennsylvania were successful in increasing state budget allocations by more than **\$12 million**, making another **2,100** subsidized pre-K seats available to low-income

families. These top-line measures, while important, can mask the power inherent in bringing community voices to the forefront, forging partnerships across stakeholders, and testing new ideas, all of which play an important role in driving social change.

The numbers also do not convey how critical Strong Start for Kids is to the communities in which we work. As the second-largest private funder of early childhood initiatives in Greater Philadelphia and through meaningful, consistent investment in Charlotte, Phoenix, and London, we demonstrate how critical it is for the business community to put our resources to work in partnership with nonprofits, government agencies, and private foundations to address critical community needs.

## Program-year investments

#### **Investment highlights**

The grants shown here reflect new project commitments approved in program year 2021. Twenty-five grants were made to 21 organizations, including new and long-standing partners, to continue projects that were generating positive results or to launch new initiatives. Priorities included responding to acute needs as the pandemic lingers and integrating our equity intentionality—supporting BIPOC-led organizations or targeted activities to increase inclusion and equitable opportunities.



Five projects were active with CHOP at the end of program year 2021. Strong Start is the primary funder of the Greater Philadelphia region's Reach Out and Read program, an early literacy program that partners with pediatricians to provide new books and guidance to families about the importance of daily reading. Strong Start's grant provided approximately 80,000 children with 130,000 new age-appropriate books. Another early literacy initiative we support is a study evaluating how a promising program, LENA Start, helps parents improve the frequency and quality of conversations with their children, which affect both the children's language development and the parents' engagement. To support its broader investment in home visiting, Strong Start funds a project using CHOP's influence to strengthen home visiting organizations' response to intimate partner violence by building partnerships across nonprofit and city agencies to increase the effectiveness of referrals and retain families facing this issue in home visiting services. It child care centers, we support the adoption of an evidence-based approach to improve the behavior of at-risk children and reduce the prevalence of suspensions and expulsions. This program addresses national studies showing that vulnerable children, particularly boys of color, are being suspended and expelled from child care at alarming rates. Lastly, we support the creation of an integrated model of care for at-risk children. This innovative approach is building best practices for coordination among pediatric primary care, nurse home visiting, and quality child care to increase access to services and create a robust continuum of care.

We also support Philadelphia's grade level reading campaign, Read by 4th, a local affiliate of a national campaign and a program of the Free Library of Philadelphia that takes a systemic approach to unite families, educators, and community partners to improve children's literacy across the country.

Strong Start partners with First Up on four projects: developing and implementing a training and shared-services model for 40 in-home child care providers in Philadelphia; fund-raising and channeling more funding to high-quality pre-K centers by creating centralized support for providers and businesses to participate in Pennsylvania's pre-K tax-credit program; stewarding resources for technology needed for families and providers in West Philadelphia to utilize a virtual pre-K offer; and a new initiative that offers the early childhood workforce targeted training and tools to identify and respond to behavioral and mental health challenges in classrooms associated with trauma.

Strong Start supports a grassroots family engagement effort that deploys trained peer-to-peer mentors who connect with 1,500 families to build awareness of the importance of early childhood development, distribute information and books, and facilitate workshops. Strong Start has also supported the group's launch of Family University, a parenting workshop series.
Fund for the School District of Philadelphia	\$1,585,000	Strong Start supports the Fund for the School District of Philadelphia, the fiscal intermediary for the Philadelphi public school system, in training 600 pre-K teachers on quality literacy instruction and fully stocking classroom libraries with new books and materials.

6	People's Emergency Center	\$1,470,237	People's Emergency Center (PEC) is a multiservice organization dedicated to changing the life trajectory of families, children, and youth experiencing homelessness. With support from Strong Start since 2017, PEC has created a small team of early childhood experts that works closely with emergency housing providers to promote resilience in young children by ensuring enrollment in high-quality early childhood education. PEC also engages in advocacy to address policies and other barriers to quality child care and early learning for homeless children.
7	Public Health Management Corporation	\$1,074,184	Strong Start is partnering with the Public Health Management Corporation on two projects. One supports a deep-dive analysis of the economics of operating and sustaining child care centers to develop financial management models and standards that can be replicated across the child care sector. A second project supports the evaluation, coordination, and mapping of parenting programs to identify practices that can be replicated across interagency systems and within other multiservice agencies in Philadelphia.
8	National Nurse-Led Care Consortium	\$1,000,000	National Nurse-Led Care Consortium (NNCC) is dedicated to maternal and child health and is one of the country's most-researched home visiting models. Home visitors are registered nurses who begin working with expectant mothers during pregnancy to support healthy birth outcomes and healthy development of infants and toddlers. Since 2017, Strong Start has supported 297 families to receive NNCC home visiting services in previous grants. This grant continues support for home visiting, helps all NNCC families connect to additional resources, and provides a new service assisting families interested in child care with locating safe, quality care and accessing subsidy programs.
9	Esperanza	\$992,100	Strong Start welcomed Esperanza as a new partner in late 2020. For more than 30 years, Esperanza has been empowering its community by offering programs that cultivate self-belief, grit, and knowledge, allowing clients to develop agency, voice, and influence over their own lives. With support from Strong Start, Esperanza will implement enhancements to the early childhood education program at Esperanza College of Eastern University, provide resources to students to sustain enrollment, offer coursework to prepare students for career advancement opportunities, and establish Esperanza as a resource for Latinx early childhood professionals in Philadelphia.
10	Campaign for Grade-Level Reading	\$922,650	In 2020, Vanguard crew had the opportunity to compete in the Strong Start Challenge by submitting ideas on creative ways to engage children and families in activities that promote school readiness and family engagement. This grant represents the implementation of the winning idea of providing microgrants to families with young children in Philadelphia, Charlotte, and Phoenix to engage in local cultural institutions and experiences that cultivate learning and family attachment.

During the volunteer-led, virtual Vanguard Gives Back Campaign in 2020, crew participated in service projects, online learning events, and more, in addition to donating millions to support the Strong Start for Kids program.

Crew participated in virtual for 5K events in Pennsylvania, North Carolina, and Arizona. Crew, family, and friends also virtually volunteered at local agencies. The campaign raised \$4.4 million for Strong Start for Kids.
